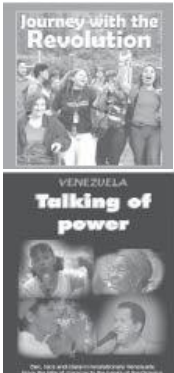

 First published in 1967 -- Tanzania's President Nyerere's development strategy based not on industry but on *ujamaa* – self-governing agricultural socialist villages. £3



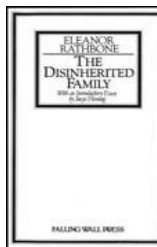
